Skatepark hits funding target

Bradford on Avon has successfully raised £250,000 to build a new skatepark for the town.

A collaborative approach involving the Town Council, SkateBoA, individuals and local organisations, means that the fundraising goal has now been achieved.

Special thanks to everyone, especially Skate BoA, which organised several well attended community events and designed the brilliant merchandise seen around town every day. The Town Council also wishes to thank Derrick Hunt (who helped greatly in closing the funding gap) for volunteering his specialist expertise in fundraising for the skatepark.

A spokesperson for SkateBoA said: "We want to say a massive thank you to everyone from the Bradford on Avon community who helped support the small but mighty SkateBoA team and our efforts to raise funds for the town's much-needed new skatepark. Maverick is designing the new skatepark - a key feature of the Poulton Park masterplan, which will be open to consultation later this year. Bradford on Avon Mayor, Councillor Katie Vigar said: "It is tremendously exciting to have reached this stage in progressing towards a new skatepark as part of our project to revitalise Poulton Park for the benefit of skaters and the wider community too."

New faces at the Town Council

hanges are taking place at Bradford on Avon Town Council as we welcome new staff members and take on even more responsibilities in the town.

Firstly, we would like to introduce our Deputy Town Clerk, Chris Stringer, *pictured right*. Chris has previously worked for parish councils in Salisbury, Frome and Barnstaple, looking after parks and buildings. He will be taking on responsibilities across the Town Council. Chris said: "I'm very excited to be here - and to be part of all the things happening in the town.

"I'm passionate about green spaces - especially what they offer people and communities - and I'm looking forward to being involved in projects, conversations and ideas going forward."

The Town Council has also added litter bins and grass cutting to its day-today services. In April 2022, the Town Council took over responsibility for litter bin collections and in December the contract was taken in house so the Town Council could take full charge of the services and standards.

A programme to replace litter bins

has already started, with the first replacements at the top of Silver Street - after it was badly damaged earlier this



year - and on Culver Close.

Bradford on Avon Mayor, Councillor Katie Vigar, said: "Litter bins are one of those small things that can make a big difference. We all take pride in our beautiful town, and keeping it litter-free is an important part of that.

"I look forward to seeing the new bins as they are installed and am grateful to the staff and volunteers who make such an effort to keep the town clean and tidy for residents and visitors alike."

To help keep up the standard of services the town deserves, we have also taken on four new Town Wardens: Matthew Powell, Andy Martin, Mike Hayward and Stuart Hunt. You may have already seen them on the beat: we offer them a warm welcome to the Town Council team.

Precept rise will help to fund increased responsibilities

At the Full Council meeting on Tuesday, 10 January, the Town Council voted to raise the precept (the Town Council's share of your council tax) by 6 per cent.

This means a Band D property in the town will pay £250.61 per year - an increase of £1.20 per month - as their share of the Town Council precept in 2023/2024.

When considering the budget for the next financial year, the cost of living crisis was at the forefront of the process. The 2023/24 budget seeks to minimise the burden on personal finances while not ignoring the increased overheads the Town Council faces due to inflationary pressures.

One of the key areas of growth in the 2023/24 budget relates to the planned and much-needed improvements to play areas acquired during the asset transfer from Wiltshire Council.

The increase will help to fund other additional services and responsibilities

that the Town Council has taken on from Wiltshire Council, including the management and care of green spaces such as Barton Farm Country Park, and the maintenance and emptying of the town's litter bins.

A total of £15,000 of the Town Council's overall budget of £1,283,020 is being funded from reserves. This has been done to limit the precept rise, while still enabling the Town Council to deliver projects and work across the town.

ver the winter months, the Town Council worked on a series of projects to support our town centre businesses during tough economic times.

Councillors heard from business owners before Christmas about the challenges they are facing at the moment - and came up with a series of ideas and initiatives to support them through the winter and into the first part of the new year.

The town's festive lights have stayed up longer than usual as part of our Bradford on Avon Shines On scheme - putting a spotlight on the town centre businesses, including our independent shops and restaurants - and welcoming people to the town during the darker winter evenings.

Adding to the cheerful atmosphere, buskers in The Shambles and Lamb Yard provided a variety of musical entertainment for shoppers and visitors.

Town Council officers revamped the popular Shop Local Shop Local scheme and launched it to coincide with the Explore BoA Advent Calendar. The new and improved scheme is aimed at providing increased support to businesses by promoting sales, special offers and more. With more people regularly shopping local, it is hoped that businesses can increase stock ranges and that new shopkeepers will be attracted to the town.

Two illustrated signage boards have been installed at the Town Bridge bus stops to help encourage visitors to discover all our town centre has to offer, whether they arrive by bus, train or having parked in the car parks. A similar flyer to households across the town and into surrounding villages was a further part of the Shop Local campaign.

Mayor, Councillor Katie Vigar, said: "Our wonderful independent town centre businesses are a huge part of what makes Bradford on Avon so special. But we need to back them if we are to keep them. Our aim is to raise the profile our town centre and we hope that visitors and residents enjoy spending time here - whether that's shopping local or meeting a friend for a coffee."

Volunteer group seeks cool and committed co-ordinator

Bradford on Avon Community Emergency Volunteers (CEVs) are looking to appoint a motivated and passionate person to co-ordinate the group. The CEVs are supported by the Town Council.

As an example of the kind of emergency the CEVs can be called on to deal with, earlier this year they came to the rescue of a resident whose home was badly flooded during January's heavy rainstorms.

The resident paid tribute to the commitment of the group. He said: "During the five days of the ingress, over 20 people bailed out over 6,000 gallons of water, and over half of the folk were Community Emergency Volunteers. Tim (Councillor Trimble) did a wonderful job of liaising with everybody, finding sandbags from nowhere, keeping me informed and helping to boost morale – and everybody offered support and quiet encouragement.

"I owe you a great debt of gratitude. You came to help me when I needed it most, and I am truly grateful."

Traffic modelling under discussion

n late November, the Town Council held a meeting with MP Michelle Donelan and the then Wiltshire Council cabinet member for highways, Councillor Mark McClelland, to discuss the progress on developing a new traffic solution for the town.

At the meeting, Wiltshire Council confirmed its request for a two-thirds contribution to traffic modelling costs from the Town Council. Modelling is necessary for any potential scheme in order to design a traffic system for the town which will best enhance pedestrian and cyclists' safety and comfort, help reduce traffic volume and improve air quality. All these were priorities identified in the transport consultation. Since that meeting, Councillor McClelland has resigned from his cabinet position and Councillor Caroline Thomas has stepped in to the role.

At Full Council on Tuesday, 10 January, Town Councillors agreed to put aside up to £25,000 (half the total cost) for traffic modelling as an interim step while seeking further assurances about the nature of the modelling process before agreeing to pay.

As we went to print with this issue of *The News*, the Town Council was about to meet Councillor Thomas to show her around the town and explain first hand Bradford on Avon's traffic problems.

Can thermal imaging help save on bills?

Worried about heating bills? Don't know what to do to reduce costs? That was me: but last year I invested in a CHEESE (Cold Homes Energy Efficiency Experts) survey to see how I could reduce heating costs.

The survey on my detached, stone-walled house (built before 1841) took 2 ½ hours. First the house was heated as high as it would go (21°C due to heat loss). A fan drew the warm air outside and a thermal imagining camera was used to survey the house, finding where cold air was being drawn in through cracks and gaps in the windows, doors, skirting boards etc. I was given a tablet on which I could also view the camera images and see where all the draughts were coming from.

Finally I was given a USB of the thermal imaging to keep, so I could decide what to do to save energy. The major source of heat loss - three holes behind the fireplace and up into the chimney - have now been filled with bricks and mortar, as have other draught-emitting cracks, using insulating materials and sealants. The chimney has also been insulated. So the survey has definitely helped me to reduce heat loss through the gaps around the house and thus reduced my energy use.

The cost of the survey (£135 for me) depends on the size of your house. You can find out more about the CHEESE Project CIC at https://cheeseproject. co.uk/
