

Major upgrade for play areas

B radford on Avon Town Council has agreed to a major play area refurbishment programme, taking play provision for the town's children into the next decade.

At the latest Environment & Green Spaces Committee meeting, Town Councillors unanimously approved nearly £400,000 of works to improve the town's play areas over the next 14 years. The first round of works - valued at £175,000 - is set to begin in 2023, with completion planned in 2025.

These initial works will focus on the play areas in Poulton Field, St Aldhelm's, Bearfield, Spencers Orchard and Sladesbrook.

A spokesperson for Bradford on Avon Town Council said: "On 1 April 2022, the Town Council took over management of most play areas in the town. Previously, Wiltshire Council managed the play areas.

"Following the asset transfer, the Town Council formed a working party to agree on priorities moving forward.

"The Town Council understands the recent concerns over the play areas,

but it is hoped this announcement will assure residents that action is being taken."

A contractor regularly inspects the play

areas and alerts the Town Council to maintenance issues and priorities. The team of Town Wardens can then undertake the necessary repairs.

Views sought on affordable access to electric vehicles



People in Bradford on Avon and the surrounding area are being asked for their views on an electric vehicle hire scheme that could start up in the town.

Wiltshire Council and Bradford on Avon Town Council are asking the town's residents, businesses and community organisations for their thoughts on an electric car club, an electric bike club and bike hanger storage facilities.

The two councils are working in

partnership with electric car provider Co-Cars to assess local demand. If enough people are interested it could enable affordable access to electric cars for everyone in Bradford on Avon, while also supporting the shift to zero-carbon transport.

• The Quaker Meeting House will be open to all every Saturday between 10am and 2pm to provide a warm space, as well as soup and a roll.

• On the first and third Monday of every month **Avon Stitchers meet in the United Church Hall** between 2pm and 4.30pm. Attendance is £5.

• Every third Wednesday of the month from 12.30pm-2pm the **Zion Church** is offering free soup and roll lunches; every second Saturday of the month it hosts a coffee morning from 10.30am-12.30pm.

• The Community Church in St Margaret's Street is open as a warm space Monday 11am-1pm, Tuesday to Thursday 9.30-1pm. Note: there is a Ladies' Gathering 10.30am-12pm on Wednesday, and a Men's Gathering 10.30am-12pm on Friday. On Fridays it also opens from 12.30pm offering free soup and a roll. • Every second Friday of the month, **The Hub** holds a coffee morning between 10am and 12pm. The Hub also hosts hot lunches every Thursday. Booking required.

Bradford on Avon Town Council has said thank you and goodbye to its long-serving Town Clerk Sandra Bartlett, who retired at the end of September after more than two decades of dedicated service.

Sandra has been with the Town Council since 1999 and has worked tirelessly to shape Bradford on Avon into the town it is today.

Her leadership has resulted in the Town Council achieving the refurbishment of St Margaret's Hall, saving the Youth & Community Centre, bringing back the Tourist Information Centre, saving the public toilets, overseeing the transfer of assets from Wiltshire Council and the achievement of the Gold Quality standard from the Local Council Award Scheme.

Sandra, along with the then Mayor John Potter, also led the charge to bring back the Flower & Produce Show, with the help of her father.

Sandra said: "The Town Council has grown so much since I started and it has been a pleasure to see its journey. I want to thank all of my colleagues and I hope they have learned something from me, as I have learned so much from them.

"I've always been proud of how the Town Council has worked with community groups to achieve the best for the town. I've enjoyed working with the Town Mayors over the years and I'm proud of all the good we have achieved as a council." Sandra will be succeeded by former Director of Operations, Ian Brown. Since joining the Town Council in 2018, Ian has provided councillors with guidance on important projects working alongside Sandra. He brings to his new role extensive knowledge gained from a long career in local government at both district and unitary levels.

Ian said: "I am absolutely delighted to be given the opportunity to lead such a forward thinking Town Council. I hope to follow in Sandra's illustrious footsteps and continue to develop the Town Council in supporting the town."

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Climate Friendly BRADFORD ON AVON

Keep Warm this Winter with some low-cost fuel-saving tips: Save Fuel, Save the Planet

The Town Council has been working on a domestic heating study, with Climate Friendly and thermal survey companies CHEESE and AsBuilt, to find ways to help save fuel and costs in our homes. Some measures are expensive, but here are some 'quick fixes' that might help:

Insulation: Improving insulation in your roof and walls is the most important first step, before embarking on more expensive installations. You might be eligible for grants for this and other energysaving measures: you can get free advice and support from www. warmandsafewiltshire.org.uk or call 0800 038 5722.

Draughts: A thermal survey can show where heat is lost. Use draught excluders around doors, insulating tape or caulking around draughty windows, cover letterboxes and keyholes, and use plumber's putty to block holes around pipes under sinks.

Chimneys: Insert a 'chimney sheep' or an old pillow in a plastic bag into unused chimneys; remember to remove in spring to dry out.

Radiators: Install reflective panels behind your radiators, and ensure your radiators are not obstructed by clutter or furniture.

Thermostats: Turning the dial down by even 0.5 degrees can save a lot of fuel. If you don't have good heating controls you may be eligible for help.

Dehumidifiers: A damp home is bad for your health and for the fabric of your home. It also takes more fuel to heat damp air.

Curtains and rugs: Thick curtains at windows and doors help reduce heat-loss, as do rugs.

Dress warmly: insulate yourself to stay cosy - thick socks, extra sweater, heated gilet.

Cooking: Only boil the water you

need in the kettle, and consider

low-energy options: microwave, slow-cooker or pressure cooker.
