The next meeting has been arranged for 7th February 2023.

Chair's Report for the Community and Well-Being Committee meeting on 20th September 2022.

I attended the AGM for the Monday/ Wednesday Club on 27th July. This club, in Trowbridge, has been running for many years and many of the people who attend have been going regularly since it opened. There are four people from Bradford and Avon who are transported there by minibus provided by the club. The Town Council provides a grant to cover the cost of the bus and a donation to the running of the club. They are also supported financially by Trowbridge Council. I was inspired by the commitment of the volunteer staff and the members, and the pride they have for what they do to support people who are disadvantaged and disabled.

On 22nd July Alzheimer's Support, the Co-op and the Dementia Action Alliance held a "CommuniTea" Party in St. Margaret's Hall. The Hall was very kindly donated to us by the TC. This was enjoyed by all who attended and we raised over £300. .

The Cinema Club for people with dementia and their carers and for older people began on Wednesday,14th September. .

The Aldhelm 60+ Club now has five new members who started after seeing the notice in the last TC News letter. During the summer we had a trip down the canal and a cream tea on the Barbara McClelland We are going to see the pantomime on 15th December.

I attended a Churches Together meeting on 8th September where I was made most welcome. I talked about the Warm Spaces project and invited the Churches to our next meeting if they were able to help. The next meeting was very well attended and the banners are now up in the town with leaflets explaining what is available in various shops, the library, the surgery and the Town Council Offices. The first film for the family cinema held on Sunday afternoon was well received and attended. The next one, on 20th November at 2pm in St. Margaret's Hall, is Lightyear. Refreshments are free and the entrance fee is £2 per person or £5 per family. Concessions are available.

I am now a Town Council supported trustee at The Hub and we are to discuss Cllr. Alison Potter joining me later in this meeting.

I attended, in my role as Deputy Mayor, the launching of Tea with a Pony at Widbrook Equestrian Centre. It was also attended by Michele Donelan in her role as our Wiltshire MP. The project will provide disabled children and vulnerable adults the opportunity to benefit emotionally from interacting and, maybe, riding horses within a safe and nurturing environment. I witnessed this first hand and was very impressed.

I attended the South West in Bloom awards ceremony at Hazelbury Mill, near Crewkerne. BoA received a Silver Gilt award. Chris Hogg and I are aiming for a Gold next year, with the support of our great volunteers, councillors and TC staff.

I attended an event at the Hub in my role as Deputy Mayor. The Co-op in the centre of the town had awarded three grants last year and the recipients explained how they had been used. They were Mighty Girls, the Hub and Trowbridge Futures.






Update Report June-August 2022

What has been delivered?

During the reporting period BoA Youth has delivered a mix of sessions. The breakdown for session delivery and engagement from young people is shown below.



During Youth Centre sessions in the young people have engaged in:

- Hosting and Performing in a Talent show
 - Baking & Cooking workshops



Supporting community Initiatives and Individual Growth

- We continue to embrace and promote the importance of community living within BOA Youth. As such we have nurtured our sense of relational growth within the BoA Youth community.

The children have been able to make new friends, discover new skills, and develop key motor and social skills while having fun within a safe and monitored environment. Some of the activities the service users have specifically enjoyed include: paddleboarding, our milkshake-making session, our Hawaii-themed party where they were able to try coconut water and passion fruit, and our talent show.











Promoting Collaborative partnerships and Community supports: Boa Youth 'Mini Fair'

-During the summer holidays we were able to collaboratively work with the BOA skatepark group to organise and host a fundraiser to support their goals. Through teamwork, volunteering, and the efforts of the young people, we were able to successfully host a 'mini fair' and raise just over £70. We hope to develop a monthly recycle/ swap stop ran by the youth to provide a space for people to swap and sell preloved items and we hope to continue to raise funds for activities and local







charities of the young people's choice.

Previous Key Issues answered:

Combating Food Poverty:

We now run a youth café for our older members and are linking up with Sainsburys to deliver meals and cooking sessions. With the help of our Local Sainsburys champions, who have kindly provided free fruit, veg, and dried goods amongst other things, we have been able to provide free fruit and veg to the children within the session. This has been a huge success with many children trying Blueberries and Celery for the very first time and enjoying it. We hope to continue to provide seasonal fruit and veg snacks while teaching the children about how and when different products are grown.



Utilising our Resources:

We continue to obtain feedback from service users and their careers about how to best utilize our resources. A comment made has been to have BOA youth link up more with the schools and provide more guest speaker events about key topics such as politics, climate change and professional development. It has also been suggested that we organise more shows (i.e. Art gallery, talent show, musical performances) inviting the community to come and see the youth showcase themselves. We are continuously working on building a better connection amongst different generations of our community and will continue to use the feedback to develop our sessions.

Present Key Issues

- 1. With the economic uncertainty facing many families this winter we are keen to be able to support the youth as much as possible to combat issues such as food poverty. We hope to continue working with Sainsburys and other businesses to support the youth this winter and gather feedback for the council relating to how and what people may be struggling with.
- 2. We are continuously in talks with young people about how to best utilise our resources and develop a youth service and council. It has become apparent that mental health support is a key necessity for the youth during these uncertain times. We are reminding and utilise our support service to support individuals who require support with their mental health. We hope to be able to liaise with local schools and support services in a better way to be able to deliver 1:1 support and interventions to the wider community through individual/ group activities and workshops such as mindfulness, sports, art, and music as well as therapeutic support.






Update Report Sept-Oct 2022

During the reporting period, BoA Youth has delivered a variety of sessions requested by the centre members. The breakdown for session delivery and engagement from young people is shown below.




During Youth Centre sessions in the young people have engaged in:

- Architecture-themed Recycled craft projects
- Festive celebrations of Halloween and Guy Fawkes
- Football skills session hosted by Ex England football player
 - Baking & Cooking workshops



Supporting Individual Growth and promoting community initiatives

-This term our focus has been on sustainability and working with the children to clear up our centre and recycle any unneeded items. As such we have been able to host a fashion show as well as a cardboard house-building workshop. We continue to embrace and promote the importance of community living within BOA Youth. As such we have nurtured our sense of relational growth within the BoA Youth community, bringing in local young people as face painters, volunteers and tuck shop assistance.





We have also celebrated Halloween as a community, insuring that all young people attending got the

chance to carve a pumpkin, this was one of the most successful evenings with children coming in dressed up during the half-term for some BoA-style celebrations.







A Space for everyone: Combating communal hardships

-Opening our **Youth café** has allowed us to notice and appreciate the needs of the service users. As previously mentioned in our last report food poverty continues to affect numerous families within the local community, and to combat this we have been able to team up with the local Sainsburys via Neighbourly, to receive collections. Thanks to this the young people have been able to make meals including Carbonara, Spag bowl, Cake, Chicken and rice and salad wraps to eat in and take home. They have also enjoyed making use of the facilities such as the basketball area, the pool table and every so often even the art supplies.



We have noticed numbers increasing with the new offer of Free meals and a warm space to gather and chat about family, education, friendships and all other topics that come to mind. During our sessions, we have been able to gather some feedback from the children who have noted that family life, specifically finances are becoming a struggle, as such the subs have decreased but we have gathered some fundraising ideas that young people are in talks about for the new year. We have signposted many families to services provided by the council including the community fridge, which has been well received.

Revitalising the community space:

We are continuously in talks with young people about how to best utilise our resources and have began to clear out the centre space, and discussing what we would like to see. Working with other groups using the centre we have been able to recognise and what may need addressing and how best we could support this process. We are keen to continue to develop a clear plan, using the young people's voice to shape a space fit for everyone.



The results from our annual survey answered by 340 individuals showed us that the percentage of young people struggling was highest in BoA, Staverton, and Holt which had between 49% and 57% of respondents in that area reporting they were struggling with emotional well-being.

This has a key theme that we have tried to address, we have opened up a quiet space (within the art room) during our sessions where young people can go and take some time out or have private chats and get advice from peers and/or staff members. Additionally, we have made sure to make the space as fun and safe as possible as we are aware for many it has become a safe haven, breaking up some of the strain of everyday life we are all currently facing.

Mental health support is a key necessity for the youth during these uncertain times. As such we continue to collaborate with other local services to support the service users through




targeted sessions and signposting to appropriate services and aim to continue to be able to better understand the key areas in which the youth within our service and their families feel they require our support.

Update Report July- August 2022

What has been delivered?

With the cost-of-living crisis affecting many local people including the new residents from Ukraine we have been able to organise and deliver 12 additional universal sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings (8.30- 12pm) during the school summer holidays to help families working and needing childcare.

With Bradford on Avon Town Council kindly subsidising and providing the youth centre and St Margaret's Hall for us to host children's activities this summer holidays, we have been able to successfully deliver a range of activities for children aged 5 to 13.



The sessions, covering a range of fun and exciting activities, cost £5 per child, per session. We were also able to provide a 'Walking Bus' service to the children that needed to be transported to their next activities. This seemed to be a huge help to the Ukrainian parents unable to get out of work commitments and allowed us to make better connections with the children.



Outcomes

Providing Support, Forming Connections & Building community

- -During sessions we were able to provide a breakfast club service which was a success with all the children and insured they were able to at least eat one of their 5 a day.
- -The building of connection y has been encouraged by a focus on "teamwork"—through gaming and sharing within sessions, service users were able to interact with new people and discover new ways of socialising. The language barrier was not an issue and the Ukrainian children were able to develop their English skills further by socialising with the staff and other children. And we were able to discover and dance to some fantastic Ukrainian music!
- -The past term has held a sense of relational growth within the BoA Youth community—between young people, the team and young people, and networking/linking with other services.








Feedback

- The Morning Youth Service had an overall attendance of over 100 over the summer event held by BoA Youth and The Town Council, with many new faces hoping to continue attending the centre.

Bradford on Avon Town Council Residents' Panel Report on survey three: Events

The purpose of the Residents' Panel is to help the Town Council hear views from across the community. The panel is formed of 100 residents selected to complete surveys a few times a year on Town Council activities, policies and services.

Panellists were sent (either via email or post) the Residents' Panel survey for Friday, 7 October. Panellists were given until Friday, 22 October to complete the survey. Of the 100 panellists, 86 panellists responded to the survey — this represents a 24.6 per cent rise from the initial survey.

This report will detail the questions (in bold and italicised) and the responses either specific or groups given by the panellists. Where individual answers are highlighted, they appear as they were written by panellists. Some questions allowed for panellists to select multiple options. In others, panellists were given open text options where multiple answers could be given within a single text answer.

Standout Comments

"I have noticed that the advertising for events from the Town Council is sporadic. Some events are advertised properly, using different media and then others will only appear one online. For events to be accessible for all, all sectors of the Town's population need to know about them. This means events need to be advertised on posters, leaflets, online, on websites and on social media. For example, my 75 yr Mother had no knowledge of a recent event and when she asked me where I had heard about it, I realized it was on Facebook Group page."

Conclusions

As noted in the preamble since the launch of the Residents' Panel there has been a 24.6 per cent rise in response rate from panellists. Answers reinforced the Town Council's decision to run family-friendly films as part of its Warm Spaces project, as well as those willing to pay a small fee towards the running of the events (Sunday Film Club). The responses also reaffirmed the value of the long-standing Tea Dance events.

Panellists indicated that posters/ banners, social media, word of mouth and the newsletter were the most effective ways of promoting events in the town. Equally, panellists showed support for more live music in Bradford on Avon. Currently, the Town Council and community volunteers are organising a music festival to take place in summer 2023.

Other portions of the results will be fed back to the Events & Tourism Officer and the Facilities Manager.
