

Way forward on traffic agreed

Bradford on Avon Town Council has unanimously approved the aims of a traffic scheme to recommend to Wiltshire Council, the highways authority.

At the Full Council meeting on 24 September, town councillors agreed to ask Wiltshire Council for:

• 20mph speed limits throughout the town

• wider pavements maximised throughout the scheme, particularly at the bottom of Silver Street and the top of Market Street

• one-way traffic down the hill (east to west) on Silver Street

• a trial of either one-way traffic up the hill on Market Street, or priority for traffic coming up the hill on Market Street, with the decision about which of these to trial based on advice from Wiltshire Council's highways engineers

• mitigation measures for areas expected to see significantly more traffic

• consultation with emergency services, bus services and local schools on the impact of any scheme.

Masons Lane would remain two-way to the top of Market Street (to enable access to Newtown), as it did in 2020/21 when the Covid/lockdown traffic management scheme was in place.

Mayor of Bradford on Avon, Councillor Jack Vittles, has written to Wiltshire Council's Cabinet Member for Highways, Councillor Nick Holder, to explain the town council's decision.

In the letter, Councillor Vittles said: "As you know, we have worked alongside Wiltshire Council for the past three and a half years to reach this point and we are pleased that we have been able to reach a decision on a recommendation for a traffic system in Bradford on Avon. "As set out in your letter earlier this summer the town council had to 'demonstrate an overall level of support at a local level'.

"We believe we have achieved this, by focusing on areas of consensus among the town as well as having the backing of a unanimous vote from our town councillors.

"We now look forward to working with Wiltshire Council and your highways team to design a scheme which works for our town and achieves our key priority of improved pedestrian safety."

'Council acted in good faith', High Court finds as woodland case is dismissed

he town council is pleased that the High Court case brought against the council regarding Becky Addy Wood has been dismissed.

The judge, His Honour Judge Blohm KC, has ruled in favour of the town council, confirming that the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), between the Friends of Becky Addy Wood (FROBAW) and the town council is binding, that the town council has complied with its duty to consult with FROBAW in the production of the management plan for the woodland and that the claimants, Lisa Otter-Barry and Christopher Humphries, do not have any trust claim over the woods, nor does FROBAW.

The judge concluded that: "The Council's attitude to negotiations appears to be clear and open... Mr Hogg's report to committee is the Management Plan; it did not need to be agreed... [and] I consider that it satisfies the agreement requirement."

The town council is particularly pleased that the judge recognised that the officers and councillors involved in the case have undertaken their roles in good faith.

The town council deeply regrets that it was obliged to spend considerable officer and councillor time and £463,025.05 in legal fees and disbursements fighting this case. It was not possible to withdraw from the case as it was brought against the town council. Despite undertaking two rounds of mediation and offering a number of opportunities to settle and stop this legal case, the claimants pursued the case to trial.

The next step is to seek a costs award from the court and the town council will be working rigorously to recover as much taxpayers' money as possible. It plans to continue to undertake its duties under the MoU and hopes that the town council and FROBAW can move forward with a positive working relationship.

We stand by the fact that we have engaged with those individuals in good faith throughout this process, attempting to avoid this expensive and ti consuming case.

Councillor Katie Vigar, mayor during the period of the case, said: "It is a great sadness that a wonder community project, undertaken to protect this woodland, ended up in court. The town council's has always been to protect the wood and ensure public safety, so that it can be enjoyed as a public amenity and its ecological value safeguarded and promoted."

Mayor Councillor Jack Vittles said: "We particular regret that this court case has forced the town cou away from other important projects - not just for t woods, but across the wider town.

"This court case has taken up a considerable amo of councillors' and officers' time over the last two

Did you know?

• there are more than 80 litter and recycling bins in **Bradford on Avon** • between April 2023 and March 2024, it cost over

£23,000 to dispose of the waste and recycling from all these bins

• our Town Wardens check and empty the bins over 15,000 times each year

• in 2023, the Wardens collected 1 tonne of recycling and over 32 tonnes of waste from the town's bins

• so far in 2024, we've already collected over 31 tonnes of waste - and just under 1 tonne of recycling

The litter bins in the town are for general waste - and everyone putting their litter in the bins helps to keep the town clean and welcoming.

Sadly, we've noticed people disposing of household waste and commercial waste in our bins. This results in more collections and more cost to us.

This is also against the law. This year, we've worked with Wiltshire Council to deal with commercial waste dumped in our bins - and local businesses have been identified and fined.

What you can do to help

• if a litter bin is full, please take your rubbish home and put in your household bin. Don't drop your litter and please don't put it next to or on top of a bin

• take your recycling home with you if you can't see a recycling bin

• larger items should be put in household bins or taken to the local household recycling centres, where there is capacity to deal with them. Don't break them down and force them into the bins.

Looking ahead

We're currently reviewing whether the current bins are all in the right places - and whether we can add more recycling bins.
